- The current striping and the Almond/San Antonio intersection, without improvements, almost requires bicycles to ride on the wrong side of the road, or on the sidewalk. This understandable but dangerous behavior is observed every single day in the morning, as more than 100 bikers use this route to get to school and go home.
- The proposed bicycle track is a HUGE improvement in providing a safer route and will
 encourage more students to ride and walk. The route will appear to be and actually be
 safer. We teach our students to follow all traffic laws, but safe roadway design is a more
 powerful and effective strategy to get walkers, riders and drivers to follow laws and
 keep each other safe.
- We encourage walking and biking to school, for all of the obvious reasons that benefit
 our students, our neighbors and the environment. The proposed cycle track is a critical
 step the city can take to support that goal and the safety of the students of Los Altos
 High.
