The City of Los Altos is truly a special place to live, work and play. Surrounded by the high tech Silicon Valley, Los Altos offers a small town charm I know residents value greatly. Highly rated schools, beautiful parks, strong business and safe neighborhoods contribute to the outstanding quality of life here in Los Altos.

Thanks to the hard work and determination of our employees, the City has continued to provide quality services despite lower staffing levels during the recent economic downturn. The City ended the 2014/15 fiscal year with a positive balance, allowing the City to continue building its fiscal reserves.

The investment in public capital improvements and key infrastructure projects including the First Street Streetscape, San Antonio Road Streetscape and Downtown Intersection improvement projects in recent years is now helping to fuel a rebounding local economy. Private investors have created new restaurants, retail shops, residential projects, commercial buildings and a new boutique hotel in Los Altos.



The City Council is committed to engaging our residents and gaining their involvement in decision-making and policy development. The City continues to implement ways to make it easier for busy professionals, families and those with limited transportation to participate in City government. Significantly earlier posting of City Council meeting agendas was implemented in early 2015, giving community members additional time to review and get involved in meetings regarding topics of interest. Additionally, residents can now connect with the City digitally on Nextdoor.

The City of Los Altos experienced many positive accomplishments during the past year and this Annual Report provides the opportunity to highlight those achievements along with the services provided and available to community members. CITY COUNCIL

The Los Altos City Council members are dedicated to their roles as policy makers and are committed to maintaining the special character and vibrancy of Los Altos.

Each year, the City Council sets priority goals and in 2015, those goals are to: continue prudent fiscal management; address aging infrastructure; develop a Downtown Plan; and to promote effective government.

Los Altos is a full-service city and operates under the Council-Manager form of government. City Council members are elected at-large to four-year terms in November of even-numbered years. The Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem positions rotate among Council members on an annual basis. City Council meets the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Meeting Chambers at City Hall, 1 N San Antonio Road. The public is always welcome and encouraged to participate at meetings. City Council meetings are broadcast live on Comcast Channel 26, and are streamed live on the City website where an archive of past meetings is also available.

The City Manager is the chief administrative officer of the City and is accountable to the City Council for the performance of the City organization. Los Altos has 131 full-time employees and had an Operating Budget of \$35,187,934 in Fiscal Year 2014/15. Municipal operations are provided by the Office of the City Manager and the Departments of Administrative Services, Police, Community Development, Public Works and Recreation & Community Services.

HONORS AND AWARDS

Finance Department

For the 9th consecutive year, the City of Los Altos received the **Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting** from the *Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada* for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. This is the highest form of recognition in governmental accounting and financial reporting.

Police Department

Agent Eric Brooks and Officer Jessica Vernon received special recognition from *Mothers Against Drunk Driving* for their enforcement efforts to curb DUIs in Los Altos. Officer Julie Tannock and Police K9 Lord took home a first place trophy at the annual K9 Witmer-Tyson Trials, a competition that tests Police dogs and handlers in the areas of search and protection as well as obedience and obstacles.

Recreation Department

The Los Altos Senior Program was honored to be the recipient of the Sereno Group's 1% Percent for Good Campaign donation. The group generously donated \$10,373, which was used to provide the senior program facilities with new paint and furniture – further enabling the program to offer an engaging, friendly and safe place for Los Altos residents age 50+.

Age-Friendly City

Los Altos has been honored with the distinction of being named an *Age-Friendly City* by the World Health Organization. Age-Friendly status indicates the community is successfully adapting structures and services to be inclusive of and accessible to older individuals with varying needs and capacities. Current demographics indicate nearly 20 percent of the City's approximately 30,000 residents are aged 65 and older. The Los Altos Senior Program is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life of our older population by encouraging seniors to remain active and by providing opportunities for interaction and healthy aging.

Bike Friendly City

The City of Los Altos was awarded the *Bike Friendly Community – Bronze Level* designation by the League of American Bicyclists. The designation is active through 2018 and distinguishes the City of Los Altos as a community that welcomes bicyclists by providing safe accommodations and encouraging people to bike for transportation and recreation.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Public Safety in Los Altos

The men and women of the Los Altos Police Department are committed to providing essential public safety services at the highest caliber. Establishing positive relationships and collaboration with community members helps to ensure Los Altos remains among the safest cities in America.

The Police Department was joined by roughly 80 community members for Coffee with a Cop in May. This event provided community members an opportunity to get to know the Officers and discuss any safety concerns such as traffic, speeding and crime prevention.

In August, the Police Department celebrated National Night Out, a crime- and drug-prevention event, which brings neighbors together with law enforcement to heighten awareness and support of crime prevention efforts such as Neighborhood Watch. There are over 110 active block captains in the Neighborhood Watch Program, double the amount participating just three years ago. For more information, visit www.losaltosca.gov/police.

A series of Public Safety Community Meetings were held in March to discuss and share information regarding crime trends in the City and region. A spike in residential burglaries early in the year tapered off, no doubt in part to involved community members who closely watched over their neighborhoods and promptly reported suspicious activity.

In addition to these valuable one-on-one interactions with community members, the Los Altos Police Department also uses social media sites like Twitter, Facebook and Nixle to connect with the community and combat crime.

The Police Department is pleased to report a 13% overall reduction in crime in 2014. During the 2014 calendar year, the Police Department received a total of 16,650 calls for service. In that

12-month period, there were 50 reports of assault, 118 burglaries, 3 robberies, 192 cases of larceny, 11 auto thefts and 2 reports of arson with 290 arrests. Police Officers performed 3,353 traffic stops, issued 1,185 traffic citations, 2,169 warnings and 2,170 parking citations.

The City contracts with the Santa Clara County Fire Department for a full suite of services. In 2014, the Fire Department provided rescue and emergency medical services for 1,350 incidents, responded to 23 fires and answered an additional 750 non-fire related calls.



The School Resource Officer provides education to hundreds of school children each year on topics such as internet safety, alcohol/drug abuse and resisting gang violence.



MAINTAINING THE CITY

Maintaining the City's roads, parks, facilities and sewer and storm systems is the responsibility of the Public Works Department. Public Works is dedicated to providing high quality Maintenance and Engineering Services, which contribute to the aesthetics, functionality and safety of public facilities.

The Maintenance Services Division is divided into parks, streets, sewers, and facilities and fleet maintenance. In addition to day-to-day responsibilities, Maintenance Services receives thousands of work orders each year, responding to reports such as potholes, traffic sign repairs and sewer back-ups.

Parks: Maintained 52.5 acres of City parks and 42 acres of City landscape boulevards

Streets: Maintained 104 miles of City streets to ensure safe conditions for motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians

Sewer: Maintained 108 miles of sewage collection systems and responded to 280 sewer system calls 24-hours a day for all residential and commercial users in the City; the Sewer section also maintained 6.3 miles of creeks and 55 miles of storm drain pipes

Facility and Fleet: Maintained 136,000 square feet of City buildings and also provided automotive maintenance for 64 City vehicles

Doing Our Part to Save Water

The Maintenance Services Division played a critical role in the City's response to Governor Brown's call for a 25% state-wide water reduction. The Los Altos District, which includes the cities of Los Altos, Cupertino and Mountain View, the Town of Los Altos Hills and unincorporated Santa Clara County, was assigned a 32% reduction target. The Maintenance team implemented several water-saving measures at City-owned facilities including:

- Installing faucet aerators which dispense only 0.5 gallons per minute rather than the regular 2 gallons per minute

- Restrooms received water-saving flush kits
- Prioritizing repair of reported water leaks
- Adjusting sprinkler range and coverage at parks and in street medians to curb runoff
- Converting sprinkler systems into miles of drip irrigation across City medians and various other locations

Water conservation measures implemented across the board by the City, residents and businesses have helped Los Altos achieve the 32% water reduction goal. Thank you to all Los Altans who continue to conserve by cutting back on water usage, replacing landscaping with drought tolerant plants and promptly fixing water leaks. Engineering Public Infrastructure


The Transportation Services Division of Public Works oversees the City's Neighborhood Traffic Management Program and reviews and responds to stop sign, traffic signal and other traffic control device requests. Additionally, the Division supports regional transportation projects and initiatives as well as implementation of the City's Bicycle Transportation Plan, Pedestrian Master Plan and the Suggested Routes to School Map.

The Engineering Services Division is responsible for designing quality public infrastructure including the sanitary sewer system and storm water protection system. Engineering is also responsible for implementing the City's Capital Improvement Program, which includes preparing plans and specifications, bids, contracts and providing inspection services for all City projects.

2014/15 Capital Improvement Projects

Maintaining and improving Los Altos' infrastructure is a key service provided by the City. The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) represents the City's 5-year fiscal and strategic plan for City-wide capital improvements. From ensuring streets, parks and public facilities are well maintained to providing for the efficient and reliable delivery of the City's transportation and sewage networks, CIP projects reflect the City's commitment to providing quality infrastructure.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

With a focus on preserving and enhancing the City's appearance and character, the Community Development Department, which consists of the Building and Planning Divisions, oversees private and public development projects to ensure they are constructed and maintained in a safe and legal manner.

Planning Division

The Planning Division works to ensure all private, commercial and residential development projects are consistent with the City's General Plan, neighborhood-specific Plans and the City's Zoning Ordinance. Each of these documents provides guidelines which help to ensure new developments align with the general character of the City or a particular area. Planning also works with Code Enforcement when necessary to document and correct code violations.

In May 2015, the City Council adopted the 2015-2023 Housing Element, one of seven mandated elements of the General Plan, which is intended to ensure the City meets the existing and projected housing needs of all economic segments of the community. The Housing Element analyzes housing needs, available resources for providing it, and establishes policies and programs which guide future housing development.

Planning is responsible for overseeing implementation of strategies outlined in the City's Climate Action Plan (CAP), which was adopted by the City Council in 2013. The CAP provides a plan for how the City will comply with State Assembly Bill 32 (AB 32), the Global Warming Solutions Act, which directed public agencies in California to support the state-wide target of reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions to 1990 levels by 2020. While the primary benefit of the CAP is reduction in GHG emissions and improved air quality, reduction measures clearly support improved quality of life for community members. This includes reducing household energy costs, supporting schools and youth and protecting natural resources.

Building Division

Building is responsible for ensuring all construction activity follows safety standards set forth by the State of California. Building regulates construction and renovation of residential and commercial buildings by providing architectural and structural plan checks, building inspections and managing permit services.

The Building Division oversaw a large number of development projects in 2014/15:

- 1,751 permits were issued
- Valuation of permitted improvements totaled \$145,226,916
- 7,227 inspections were performed



Economic Development

The City's Economic Development program is administered through the Office of the City Manager and serves as a liaison between businesses, commercial districts and the City. Economic Development provides support and assistance to existing and prospective businesses in order to preserve and enhance the business climate. A strong business climate fosters a high quality of life for residents by providing conveniently located shopping destinations and also ensuring the City's sales tax base remains robust.



Downtown Parking Management Plan

Downtown Los Altos has transformed over the past few years, reflected in what is now a thriving business district. Economic growth has created an increased demand in parking. While public parking lots adequately meet the need of parking demand during non-peak hours, lunchtime bustle results in a noticeable strain on parking. In response, the City Council approved the development of a Downtown Parking Management Plan, adopted in September 2013. The Downtown Parking Management Plan serves as a framework for the implementation of parking management and supply strategies. Some short-term solutions have already been implemented such as expanding the number of White Dot employee parking stalls and additional staffing to address parking time limit enforcement.



RECREATION & COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Recreation & Community Services Department is dedicated to providing a diverse array of enriching classes, programs and special events. Recreation programming is available for all ages and is offered in six categories: Life-Long Learning, Health & Wellness, Performing & Visual Arts, Teens, Seniors and Community Events.

Spring brought thousands of eggs and hundreds of visitors to Hillview Park for the Annual Egg Hunt, and summer boasted eight summer concerts at Hillview and Grant Parks. After a successful pilot run from October 2014 to April 2015, the Grant Park Senior Program was made a permanent fixture at the Grant Park Community Center, located at 1575 Holt Avenue. The program is open Wednesdays from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and features a variety of wellness classes, garden and book clubs as well as other organized games and special activities.

Volunteer Program

The City honored Daniel McCandless with the Phyllis Semple Award for his nearly 3 years of volunteer service. Daniel regularly helps with the Senior Program's Friday lunches and at various special events. His willingness to lend a hand, no matter what the work entails, is inspiring.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Public Safety Enhancements

The cities of Los Altos, Mountain View and Palo Alto have partnered together to implement new technology which allows all three Police communication centers to combine efforts in a ‘virtual consolidation.’ This innovative approach to public safety collaboration merged the Computer Aided Emergency Dispatch System, Records Management System and Field Based Reporting System of each Police Department. By combining efforts, residents in all three cities can anticipate quicker response times and increased coverage in the event of disaster.


Personal Emergency Preparedness

When a disaster strikes our community, it is critical that residents are prepared to cope for the first 72 hours, as emergency responders will be most overwhelmed during this time. As such, the City is pleased to offer complimentary Personal Emergency Preparedness (PEP) courses taught by Santa Clara County Fire Department personnel. PEP courses are designed to teach residents how to be self-sufficient in the event of an emergency until relief is available and cover topics such as workplace and home safety tips, what to include in an emergency supply kit and what to do when phone lines are down and you can’t reach your family.

Third Street Green

In partnership with Passerelle Investment Company, the City hosted the Third Street Green during the month of August 2014. Located on Third Street between State Street and Plaza North, this temporary pop-up park featured approximately 2,500 square feet of synthetic turf, Adirondack chairs, tables and shade umbrellas. Night-time dynamic lighting was installed in the trees overhanging the space and a piano was placed on the Green for passersby to play and enjoy. All programming was managed by Passerelle, which included free concerts, trivia nights and various other activities for all ages to enjoy.




FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

The City of Los Altos has a long history of prudent financial management, which is evident from the City’s strong financial reserves and balanced budgets. The City is fortunate to have a strong property tax base to support its General Fund and ended the 2014/15 fiscal year with an operating surplus. The City maintains several reserve funds including a General Fund Reserve of \$6.8 million or 20% of annual operating expenditures. In addition, the City has purposefully set aside funds received from the sale of property and other one-time sources for future needs and projects.


In the coming years, significant investments in City infrastructure are anticipated. Many of the City’s facilities are in considerable need of repair, upgrading, and enlarging to meet community needs. Additional investments in the City’s sewer infrastructure, stormwater system, parks and streets are also anticipated as the City moves towards completion of Master Plans that identify necessary future capital investments. The City will continue to carefully evaluate competing demands for resources to ensure the overall needs of the community are met.

LOOKING AHEAD

Several key Capital Improvement Program projects have been identified for the 2015/16 fiscal year.

Redwood Grove Bank Stabilization

Currently underway in the City's Historic Redwood Grove nature preserve, this project provides for the repair of a 30-foot section of Adobe Creek and replacement of a pedestrian footbridge and boardwalk. Native plants grown from seeds and cuttings collected from the Adobe Creek watershed are being used in this restoration project, which is being completed in partnership with the non-profit agency Acterra and funded in part through a grant from the Santa Clara Valley Water District.



Downtown Plan

The City Council identified the development of a Downtown Plan as a priority in 2015. Two ad hoc citizen committees were formed and are currently reviewing matters related to the downtown – the Downtown Buildings Committee and the City-wide Parking Committee. These working groups will present their recommendations to the Planning and Transportation Commission and City Council in 2015/16. The initiation of a Downtown visioning effort is anticipated to begin subsequent to the conclusion of the committees' work, as recommendations are expected to address items such as design guidelines and zoning codes related to the downtown.

Facility Improvement Planning

Addressing aging infrastructure was also identified as a City Council goal in 2015 and facility improvement planning efforts have been underway. The City has spent the last year engaging with the community and gathering input in order to update the 2009 Civic Center Master Plan, with a focus on the facility in most need of attention – Hillview Community Center and Park. The current plan for the Hillview Community

Center and Park Project provides for the replacement of the existing community center, building of a community pool facility and improvement and expansion of Hillview Park, open space and playing fields.

Also underway, the Grant Park and Community Center is receiving a new roof. Additional improvements are planned as part of the Grant Park and Community Center Improvement Project including interior and exterior painting to provide improved aesthetics, restroom facility updates and improved ADA accessibility in order to provide an enhanced user experience.
