Neighboring communities have as many as 6 dog parks

There are approximately 3,800 dogs in Los Altos


There are 30,500 residents in Los Altos

There are 10,700 households in Los Altos (2010 Census)

Almost 40% of households have dogs






Fenced-In Dog Park
Dedicated

Off-Leash Hours Program
Shared with Existing Venue

- Adopted by City Council on May 8, 2012
- Includes aspiration to identify a location for a fenced-in dog park
- City currently maintains 45 acres of park land



Survey

Solicited input January 29, 2018 through March 8, 2018 via City website

1,127 viewings

868 responses

78% were in support of a fenced-in dog park

Dog Park Criteria



Sufficient room for off-leash activities for dogs of all sizes (at least one-half acre)



Sufficient parking



Sufficient buffer between park and surrounding residential



Access to water

Dog Park Elements

4' to 6' fence surrounding area

Adequate drainage

Nearby parking Clear,
well-placed
signage

Shade and water for dogs and owners

Seating located away from perimeter fence

Covered trash cans / waste disposal stations


McKenzie Park

Best possible location due to:

- Adequate distance from residential homes
- Existing amenities such as parking and restrooms
- Access to electrical and water

Size is the only
Non-conforming factor





Potential Scope of Work

Site Preparation

- Existing berms to be leveled
- Climbing structure relocated
- Concrete and asphalt removed

Features

- 5'fence minimum
- Approximately 7,000 sf ft
- Install drinking fountain
- Minimum of 2 large trees
- Small dog run and dog play equipment
- Drainage upgrades


Los Altos Parks' Obstacles

- Geographic location in South/Central Los Altos






Hillview Baseball Field

Violation Enforcement

Animal Control via City of Palo Alto (primary) & City of Los Altos Police Department (secondary)

- Response times will vary depending on availability and proximity
- 2 3 Animal Control Officers during regular work hours (8am – 5pm)
- On-call hours from 5pm 8am for emergency response only
- Change in City Ordinance

Potential Program Issues

Interactions between dogs and park users or other dog owners

Dogs running offsite into street

Turf wear

Excessive and disturbing barking in early morning



Evaluation of Program

- Feedback from residents and users
- Review of incidents reported to Animal Control and Los Altos PD
- Analysis of actual cost vs. expected cost
- Legal issues
- Field conditions
- Attendance and usage
