PREPAREDNESS BASICS

- Take an "All Hazards" approach!
- Register for emergency notifications
- Know where to get reliable information
- Know your evacuation routes
 - 2 ways out of your home
 - 2 ways out of your neighborhood
- Define an emergency communications plan for your household
- Get trained on basic first aid skills
- Make emergency preparedness kits and plans for your household

PREPAREDNESS CHECK-UP: EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

- AlertSCC
 - Local county emergency notification system sends alerts via voice, email and text messages
 - Messages may be county-wide (like Shelter-in-Place notices!) or targeted by neighborhood
 - www.alertscc.org
 - Register your home address and your contact info
 - Get everyone in your household registered
- NIXLE
 - Get local notices, e.g. road closure due to an event or accident
 - Text your zip code to the "phone number" 888-777
- Emergency Alert System
 - The emergency alert system can be heard during a disaster by listening to a battery operated, solar, or hand crank radio
 - Advises about emergencies such as national security, natural, environmental, and public safety information







PREPAREDNESS CHECK-UP: EVACUATION ROUTES

Where ever you are... How will you get out?


When do I evacuate my home?

- Local authorities advise evacuation
- Red Flag warning (for fire)
- Structure is on fire or approaching the structure
 - In a wildfire: *go early, don't wait!*
- Structure is structurally unsound or threatened by downed trees or power lines



PREPAREDNESS CHECK-UP: COMMUNICATIONS PLAN

- Make a reunification plan
 - House fire... Area-wide disaster...
 - Where will we meet up?
 - How will we find each other?
- Establish Out of Area Contacts
 - Telephone & cell phone service may be interrupted
 - Texting may not work
 - All household members need to have the same outof-state contact



LET'S TALK KITS!

- If you don't have one—make your emergency preparedness kits!
 - "WUSH" bag and Go bag
 - Home emergency preparedness supplies
 - Vehicle Kit
 - Don't forget your pets!
- If you have one—check it!
 - Kits require maintenance
 - Food, water, batteries, medications need rotation to stay fresh
 - Other items may need to be replaced periodically
 - Family needs change! (diapers... Tampons... Special foods...)
- Kit storage

Comments during the call:

- Canned food doesn't keep forever! I've replaced cans with freeze-dried food.
- I've changed out my water supply so it's fresh.
- I'm going to add a JetBoil to my kit.
- "Neighbors helping neighbors" really matters. Caring neighbors make a big difference right now. Call the seniors, widows, people who live alone in your neighborhood even a short chat lifts spirits.
- Store your batteries separately from the device (put them in a Ziploc bag to keep together). Alkaline batteries last a long time this way.
- LifeStraw (for individuals) and LifeStraw Community (13 gallons) are good resources for water supply.
- I'm adding photo copies of important documents to my kit.
- You can add password protection/encryption to your thumb drive, and keep documents on that.
- I'm going to follow up on shelter-in-yard from Firesafe Council.
- I want to get my amateur radio license.
- I'm getting a new car charger kit for my cell phone.

 - Get on PulsePoint and look; check the news
 - Evacuate if you feel unsafe

- Download this app to follow local Fire Department
- Tells you where/what the call for service is

- Provides free non-emergency assistance 24- hours a day,
 - 7 days a week, in over 140 different languages
- Local community resource specialist can connect you to information and help

CERT – the Community Emergency Response Team Los Altos and Los Altos Hills CERT programs invite you to get CERT-trained and to join our local teams!








Hams—amateur radio operators support community emergency communications *You're invited to join Los Altos Amateur Radio Emergency*

The Shelter-in-Yard is the new non-gathering compliant program to encourage residents to create defensible space for their homes while they are sheltering in place.

The program will utilize pictures, diagrams, and resources to help you know what work to perform in your yard while staying at home
